Scope and Content

Anne S. (Devnich) Dunn was born January 15, 1908 in Max, North Dakota. She earned a B. A. from Union College in 1933, a B.S. from the University of Nebraska in 1936, and a M. A. from the same institution in 1938. Dunn taught home economics at Union College for 36 years, retiring in 1973. For many of those years she was chair of the department. In 1931 she married Vernon S. Dunn, Union College business manager from 1950-1963. Dunn died August 1, 1996.

This collection contains fabric and stitching samples prepared by Anne Dunn when she first started teaching and a bound copy of her master's thesis.
